Systematic Reviews - New Himmelfarb Policy

More and more, systematic reviews are a popular scholarly activity for students and faculty alike. A properly done systematic review surveys all relevant published and unpublished data in order to answer a specific research question (or questions). Because the intent of a systematic review is to be an exhaustive synthesis of all pertinent information, it requires that a very thorough search be performed. Because of this, librarians are often recruited to assist with these projects as they have the skills and experience needed to thoroughly mine a wide range of information sources. The Cochrane Handbook for Systematic Reviews of Interventions even indicates the necessity of including a librarian or information specialist from the very beginning of a systematic review project

Research Guides take center stage on Himmelfarb Library's website, but what are research guides? Research guides are essentially websites within our primary website that can help you find resources to support your work - including resources that you didn't know that you needed. Himmelfarb's research guides include:

- Tutorials for conducting library research and using specific online tools and databases popular guides include Study Design 101, Covidence, and Citations
- Guides to help you consider how to foster change, teamwork, and communication popular guides include Antiracism in Healthcare, Teamwork and Team Leadership, and Correcting Misinformation with Patients
- Resources organized by school, departments, programs, and even specific courses popular guides include <u>Nursing</u>, <u>Internal</u> Medicine Residency, and Exercise & Nutrition Sciences
- Guides to support scholarly research and publication popular guides include Systematic Reviews, Case Reports and **Evidence-Based Medicine**
- Information on library services and spaces popular guides include <u>Author Services</u>, <u>Off-Campus Access</u>, and <u>Borrow from</u> Other Libraries

Himmelfarb Library's collections are continuously evolving as we assess resource usage, cost and the needs of GW's health sciences community. To recommend resources, please complete a <u>Purchase Request form</u>. You can explore the scope of our collection via <u>the one-search tool on Himmelfarb's homepage</u> which allows you to focus your search by material type (Articles + Himmelfarb catalog) or accessibility (Online Access), or to broaden your search to include all Washington Research Library Consortium libraries (Articles + GW & Consortium Catalog). Our library collections exist both online (databases, e-books, e-journals, and streaming video) and on-site (books, software, anatomical models and technology resources), and we're available to help you find and access what you need - just <u>ask us</u>.

Finally, support and instruction are at the core of Himmelfarb Library mission. Himmelfarb librarians are available to provide individual consultations as well as group instruction. They can address a wide range of topics from helping individuals develop literature search strategies to guiding groups on the use of key library databases and other resources. Our librarians will work with you to map out a session to enhance understanding and build research skills. New Library DEI Policy

Himmelfarb Library recently instituted a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Policy, which lays out principles that guide our organization's engagement with DEI issues. The policy also provides opportunities for our users to provide feedback.



The creation of this policy was a long-term project conceived of and completed by members of the library's DEI Committee as a way of better understanding and holding ourselves accountable to our mission of improving diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility throughout the library.

The policy, which can be accessed on the Library Policies webpage, covers issues in six general areas: Equity of Service; Collection Development; Facilities, Safe Spaces, and Inclusive Environment; Communications, Publications, and Language; Hiring Practices; and Collaboration. We encourage users to report when the library fails to adhere to the policy, as well as to suggest improvements to the policy. The policy is maintained by members of the library's DEI committee and will be reappraised on a regular basis.

More and more, systematic reviews are a popular scholarly activity for students and faculty alike. A properly done systematic review surveys all relevant published and unpublished data in order to answer a specific research question (or questions). Because the intent of a systematic review is to be an exhaustive synthesis of all pertinent information, it requires that a very thorough search be performed. Because of this, librarians are often recruited to assist with these projects as they have the skills and experience needed to thoroughly mine a wide range of information sources. The Cochrane Handbook for Systematic Reviews of Interventions even indicates the necessity of including a librarian or information specialist from the very beginning of a systematic review project.

At the Himmelfarb Library, we have seen a dramatic increase in the number of systematic review support requests in recent years. The projects we assist with range from stripped down versions of systematic reviews performed by a single student as part of a class project all the way up to full-blown multiyear projects involving a team of researchers, often collaborations between GW researchers and their counterparts around the world.

In addition to assisting with projects of varying scope and scale, we also offer different levels of assistance, depending on the needs of the researchers. Himmelfarb's contribution may just involve an initial consultation to help researchers understand the standard systematic review process. Most often we will also help to craft an initial search strategy which researchers can further develop, later offering feedback on search syntax as needed. Beyond acting as consultants, librarians can sometimes be full-fledged team members: involved throughout the process; crafting and executing full search strategies; and responsible for processing the search results. For these projects, the contributions of the librarian will sometimes even rise to the level of co-authorship.

As our level of involvement increases, so too does our investment of time. Given the increasing number of such requests, and in light

of competing instructional, reference assistance, and other demands, the Himmelfarb Library will soon be instituting a cost-recovery policy for those systematic review projects which are the most time-intensive for librarians. For projects which require significant and regular librarian involvement, we will develop a cost estimate based on the number of hours we believe it will take to complete the project. These charges can be paid through grant or departmental funding available to the research team.

For systematic reviews which don't require a full-service level of support, which account for the majority of the requests that the library receives, we will continue to provide consultation services free of charge. The determination of whether a particular project will require cost recovery charges will be made during an initial free consultation with a librarian. Core Title List Project

For the past several months, Himmelfarb Health Sciences Library has been working to update its Core Title List, a list of books that are considered required or essential reading for students, faculty, and other members of the Himmelfarb community. This includes titles required on syllabi from the School of Medicine and Health Sciences, the School of Nursing, and the Milken Institute School of Public Health, as well as additional books recommended by individual departments. The Core Titles list allows the library to easily check for new editions, as well as allowing us to check titles' usage and determine which books merit multiple copies or ebook licenses. The updated List is also providing expanded representation for titles required by the Nursing and Public Health programs.

We started by collecting syllabi for all courses across SMHS, Nursing, and SPH and we spent much of the summer establishing which required and recommended titles we owned and working to acquire those we didn't. We then sent current title lists to departments for review. These lists were pulled from Himmelfarb's research guides, which we use to advertise foundational books, owned by the library and organized by specific department. Department faculty were asked to review and suggest changes to these lists. This project provided an updated list of titles to inform purchasing decisions going forward.

But what does all of this mean for our users? It means updated (and more user-friendly) title lists on department-level research guides. Some of these updated lists have already been published: see the Anesthesiology quide, the Health Policy quide, and the Epidemiology and Biostatistics guide for examples of what to expect elsewhere. Additionally, the new Core Title List means that the library will be able to keep better tabs on which books are relevant for our users and have more copies (print copies and ebook licenses) available for our users.

Yet another way that Himmelfarb is working to meet our community's needs!

Share your path to Himmelfarb Library.

I've always been interested in medical misinformation. After graduating from college, I knew I wanted to go back to Graduate school for something, but couldn't quite figure out what. Can you share your path to medical school?
