Computer-Assisted Instruction at Himmelfarb

The Audiovisual Study Center provides hundreds of computer-assisted instructional programs to students and house staff. The following describes just some of the available programs.

Title: Arrhythmias Tutorial III

Publication Date: 1993

Producer: Williams & Wilkins

Author: Massachusetts General Hospital

Abstract: Part of the RxDx: Training by Computer Series, this program covers the different forms of heart block and their clinical features. The selection of pacemakers is included along with common syndromes of pacemaker malfunction.

Title: Drug Interactions

Publication Date: 1990

Producer: University of Arkansas for Medical College of Pharmacy

Author: Richard Stull, PhD

Abstract: Drug Interactions is a computer-based approach to teaching students to apply basic principles and concepts about drug interactions in order to predict the likelihood of potential or existing drug interactions when given specific patient information. The course is divided into two distinct divisions, material, which covers the basic materials of drug interactions and how, why and when they may occur, and case studies, in which basic information is applied to clinical situations.

Title: Human Diseases

Abstract: "Human Diseases" is a systems approach to the pathology of common human disorders. This course consists of 11 independent computer-based modules, each averaging one hour of student study for completion.

Title: ILIAD 4.2

Abstract: This medical diagnostic expert system and teaching tool is designed to provide decision-making support for health care practitioners and students. The program is under continuous development and the current version contains over 1500 disease frames with over 6500 disease manifestations in its current knowledge base. It operates as an "electronic textbook" covering 11 internal medicine domains. Iliad operates in both a consult and simulation mode.

Title: Immex 5.1 - Immunology Problem Solving

Publication Date: 1992

Producer: University of California, Los Angeles

Author: Ronald Stevens, PhD

Abstract: This simulation consists of basic science problems where abnormalities of the immune system exist. It is designed to aid in the instruction and examination of medical students in cellular and molecular immunology during the pre-clinical years. The student's task is to localize the defect using available hints, consults, and graphically presented test results. Card files which outline methods, key components and concepts of the immune system are included for students' reference. To encourage students to conceptualize immunology as an integrated unit, the problems are constructed such that data from a variety of sources must be obtained to reach the correct solution to the problem. The program records and stores student scores, stores test selections, elapsed time, and diagnosis choices.

Title: Learning the Sciences Basic to Medicine

Abstract: This series is based on the Independent Study Program at the Ohio State University of College of Medicine. The content structure reflects an organ system approach to curriculum design, except modules dealing with biochemistry, pathology, microbiology, and pharmacology. The modules are: 1) Cell Structure and Function; 2) Connective Tissues and Skin; 3) The Cardiovascular System; 4) The Respiratory System; 5) The Renal System; 6) The Gastrointestinal System; 7) Muscle, the Spinal Cord, and Peripheral Nervous System; 8) The Central Nervous System; 9) Molecular Biology/Genetics; 10) the Endocrine-Metabolic System; 11) Nutrition; 12) the Reproductive System; 13) and Hematology.

Title: Quick Medical Reference (QMR)

Abstract: QMR is a PC-based information and consultation program that provides diagnostic assistance. With QMR, users have instant access to information on over 600 internal medicine diseases plus complete differential diagnoses for over 4,500 symptoms, signs, and labs. Users can use QMR to discover unusual diseases or assure the accuracy of their own diagnoses.

Title: Understanding Acid-Base Disorders

Publication Date: 1992

Producer: Duke University School of Medicine

Abstract: The Duke Nephrology Series on Understanding Acid-Base Disorders is a computer-based instructional program that contains 50 clinical cases. This program gives students opportunity to practice diagnostic and decision-making skills. A series of case studies is graphically presented including history and lab values. Through multiple choice questions, the student evaluates the acid-base disorder(s) and each response is analyzed critically.

Health Care Sciences: Downloading Instructions for miniMEDLINE

Department of Health Care Sciences staff can download (transfer) citations from miniMEDLINE to their office computers by using the following instructions:

1. When miniMEDLINE instructs you to begin file capture, press <ALT> C. "CAPTURE ON" will appear in the lower right corner of the screen.
2. After the citations have scrolled by on the screen and miniMEDLINE instructs you to end local capture, press <ALT> C again. "CAPTURE OFF" will now appear in the lower right corner.
3. The file will be saved to a DOS text file called "TCPIP.OUT" which can be printed or loaded into another software package.
4. Help is available by pressing <ALT> H.

The current printing problem may be due to the way the telecommunications software is reading escape sequences. The Library is working with HCS computer staff and miniMEDLINE staff to resolve the problem. Please call the Reference Desk at 994-2850 if you have any problems.
