### **Article Publishing Charges (APCs) Waived for GW Authors!**

GW's "transformative agreements" with Cambridge University Press and the Company of Biologists allow GW authors to publish their research as Open Access at no cost to authors (Article Publishing Charges waived)! The Cambridge agreement covers nearly 50 medicine and health sciences journals. The Company of Biologists agreement covers Open Access publishing of research articles in the following three hybrid journals:

- Development
- Journal of Cell Science
- Journal of Experimental Biology

These agreements do not guarantee acceptance for publication - articles must meet acceptance criteria for the selected journal. Open Access (OA) publishing continues to be a growing option for authors as publishers expand their OA models. Keep reading to learn more about open access publishing options and how to plan for Article Processing Charges (APCs).

#### **Open Access Publishing Demystified**

Open Access journals make content available to anyone free of charge. Traditional publishing models require readers or institutions to purchase subscriptions to gain access to published content. OA articles, by comparison, can be accessed and read by anyone without payment or subscription.

Numerous OA publishing options are available. The two most common Open Access publishing models are Gold OA and Hybrid OA. Gold OA journals make all content available to readers for free, while Hybrid OA journals publish both OA articles (free to all readers) and traditional articles restricted to a subscription-based readership. Hybrid OA journals allow authors to choose whether to make their research available as OA or to publish their research using the traditional publishing mode.

## **Article Processing Charges (APCs)**

OA journals generally transfer the cost of publication from the reader to the author by charging the author Article Processing Charges (APCs) to make an article available to readers free of charge. While the cost of APCs varies by journal, the average price is between \$2,000 and \$5,000.

If you want to publish your research as OA, start thinking about how you'll pay for APCs early in the research process. It's a good idea to request funding for APCs in grant and funding proposals to ensure that you'll have the necessary funding to cover the charges when you're ready to publish your work. NIH grants and NSF grants both allow for the inclusion of publication costs in grant applications, so take advantage of this and secure publication funding at the start of your research process!
